The rapid attainment of longer life span in the 20th century, has brought about the global phenomenon of demographic ageing and resultant consequences which confront many countries...

Demographic Trends

Life expectancy, which was 43 years in 1946, increased up to 69 years in 1998.

Sri Lankan elderly enjoy a much longer life span than before.

This demographic transition has caused a marked increase of the elderly compared to the young people.

MISSION

The National Policy on older persons envisages these objectives:

- prepare the population for a productive and fulfilling life at old age socially, economically, physically and spiritually; and
- ensure independence, participation, care, self-fulfillment and dignity for those in old age.

STRATEGIES

- Population ageing should be taken into account in relevant planning.
- Equal participation of senior citizens in decision making at all levels.
- Recognize and support the contribution of senior citizens.
- Encourage senior citizens to participate in cultural, economic, social and life long learning.

- Establishment of organizations to protect their rights.
- Collect and utilize appropriate data for policy.
- Awareness of ageing population and necessary attitudinal changes.
- Publish material on relevant social issues, gerontology and geriatrics.
- Encourage media to promote positive images of ageing.

- Unify different security and pension schemes
- Ensure adequate income security and social protection
- Review and revise the regulation governing health insurance
- Educate on the benefits of savings, advantages of pre-retirement plans.
- Include elder persons in poverty alleviation plans at all levels.

OTHER PRIORITIES

- Develop a well structured and organized health care system for elders
- Build capacity for basic counselling services
- Strengthen systems for protection and promotion of elders' rights

I. Policy related key actions

- Governments are encouraged to review and appraise the achievements made in implementing internationally agreed plans on ageing.
- Governments are encouraged to formulate policies and programmes for older persons and their families through consultations with relevant stakeholders

A. Older persons and development

- raise awareness on ageing issues;
- facilitate access to information, communication and life-long learning for older persons;
- take appropriate measures to alleviate poverty in old age;
- increase awareness among younger generations about life-long preparation for old age;

- promote the continued work of older persons;
- develop appropriate policies and programmes directed towards older persons in rural areas;
- formulate appropriate policies and programmes to promote active ageing;
- provide support to older persons in vulnerable situations.

B. Older persons and their families

- promote family cohesiveness and multigenerational solidarity;
- formulate policies that enable families to continue providing support and care to older family members;
- activate family counseling to strengthen existing families and to avoid family disintegration.

C. Advancing health and well-being into old age

- implement appropriate programmes for health promotion and disease prevention;
- take measures to provide universal and equal access to health care;
- formulate and implement policies, including financial incentives, to enable families to provide long term care to older family members.


D. Ensuring enabling and supportive environments

- create barrier-free environment for older persons;
- promote the growth of older persons' organizations;
- enact legislation and strengthen legal efforts to ensure and protect the rights of older persons.
